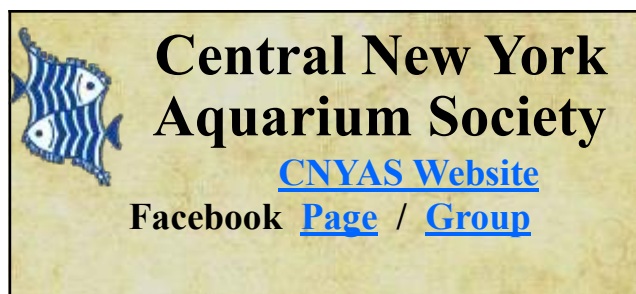

The Fish Room Pharmacy



Heather Burke is a 32-year-old aquarist from Charlotte, Michigan. She has kept and bred fish for most of her young life and harbors a keen interest and passion for the aquarium hobby. She obtained a degree in Fisheries and Wildlife at Michigan State University in May of 2016. She has previously been employed with Preuss Pets in Lansing, MI and worked for the University of Michigan as a fish room tech for a zebra danio lab. Heather also has worked at a fish wholesale facility and ran an aquatics department for an online pet retailer for two years. This talk draws from insights managing fish health in pet stores, laboratories, as well as personal collections in both high volume and low volume facilities

Talk: The Fish Room Pharmacy — This talk is a comprehensive aquarist's guide to common fish diseases and how to remedy them. Here, you can find top recommendations for fish medications to have on hand to treat or prevent outbreaks in your aquarium. This talk will also cover water quality issues that can tip the scales when it comes to fish health.

Field Trip Report

This year's Central New York Aquarium Society field trip to the Aquaculture Center at SUNY Morrisville, Empire Aquatics and Doug Hillman's fish room broke all records. A surprising 27 CNYAS members and family members showed up on a perfect Central New York Saturday autumn morning (sunny, cool and windy with lots of color in the leaves) for a tour of the facility hosted by its director, Dr. Elisa Livengood.

Dr. Livengood kicked things off with an introduction to the facility including its goals and an explanation of student involvement. The timing was perfect as this is trout-spawning season, so we got to see eggs incubating in dozens of trays that have a continuous flow of water to prevent fungus. Despite that, some eggs weren't fertilized and turned white (sound familiar?). One of the jobs of the students is to carefully remove all fungused eggs.

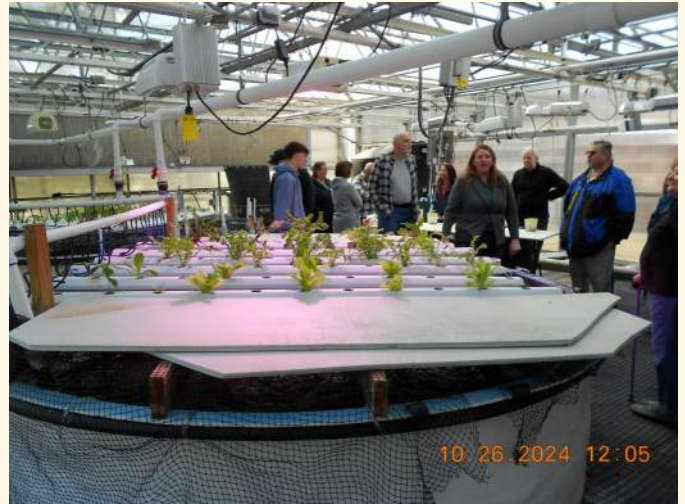

Next we entered a room containing five large circular pools packed with trout. After pointing out fin damage and body sores, Dr. Livengood explained that trout are aggressive, especially since these trout are preparing to spawn in the next several weeks. The density of fish was amazing, made possible by a constant flow of cold, fresh well water that is heavily aerated and kept flowing.

To keep all this going, the college has a maintenance building containing spare parts and the fish food. Picture your own fish supply and spare parts closet, only on a much larger scale. The Aquaculture Center requires a lot of power to run the pumps, with about 15% of it coming from a solar array. Dr. Livengood is working to increase the contribution of clean energy to the operation of the Center.

Our next stop was the greenhouse, a building that serves several purposes. First, it houses student projects experimenting with plants that can be grown hydroponically. Also on site are aquariums and tubs housing fish and turtles that have been rehomed to the college such as piranha and goldfish (an invasive species in New York) and turtles. There are two vats of 24 ancient paddlefish. Probably the most amazing thing we saw all day was how we got to view one of these fish. So how do you show your guests these ancient fish when the vat they're in is so dark, you can't see them? Well, you take off your jacket, roll up your sleeves, reach into the vat and pull one of these monsters out with your bare hands! This happened so fast, and was so unexpected, I did not have time to take a photo but fortunately one of our new members, who just joined CNYAS less than two weeks earlier, was there to snap two photos! Dr. Livengood explained that she had to almost immediately return the fish to the tank to avoid it writhing so hard it would break its cartilaginous backbone. Wow!

The final stop at the Aquaculture Center was at one of two outdoor ponds. We had the opportunity to do some complicated, scientific hands-on work here, throwing trout feed into the water and watching the fish go into a feeding frenzy.

We then drove to the college's nature museum and laboratory, located in the main part of the campus. The museum's taxidermy rooms housed an impressive number of animals from North America and Africa that had been donated to the college. In the basement was Dr. Livengood's laboratory and classroom where we viewed more student experiments and projects.

Bidding farewell to Dr. Livengood, we drove the eight miles to Empire Aquatics, one of the largest fish stores in CNY. John “Jack” Miller opened the store in 1989 and stocked it with over 200 aquariums, a 10,000 gallon indoor concrete koi pond and plenty of space for a wide variety of equipment and supplies. Jack was an active member and supporter of CNYAS, and we were saddened to learn of his passing in May 2024. His daughter, Shelly Holdridge, has taken over the store on a part-time basis, as she still has a day job. Despite the store’s limited hours, it has 170 tanks with water in them (I counted them!), including eight different species of gouramis, the best selection of gouramis I’ve ever seen in any fish store. She is performing necessary maintenance on the heating system and intends to replace the roof on the attached greenhouse. She hopes to bring the store back to its glory days when she retires and can devote full-time attention to it.

We returned to Morrisville for a group lunch at the Copper Turret restaurant. The restaurant is manned by SUNY Morrisville students enrolled in the college’s culinary arts and hospitality management programs.

Fortunately the restaurant includes a large group dining area that was plenty big enough to accommodate the 23 of us still on the field trip. Not only was the American-style food excellent, the restaurant was able to accommodate off-menu, special dietary requests, such as vegan food. Also important, considering that the meal was not paid by CNYAS, was the restaurant’s willingness to bill us individually. We were surprised when we received our checks to notice that there was no place for a tip. The manager explained that the employees are paid a living wage, so tipping was unnecessary. Everyone I talked to raved about the meal, and I heard one person promise the manager to return monthly.

Our final stop for the afternoon was Doug Hillman’s fishroom. Doug, the editor of the CNYAS *Reflector*, lives only three miles from the restaurant, in a rural log house overlooking a lake. His fishroom is one of the finest I’ve ever seen: well-designed and expertly constructed in a well-insulated converted garage. The room is neat and clean and every tank is spotless. The fish are happy as evidenced by lots of spawning and fry. I especially enjoyed shining a flashlight in a pleco cave and seeing about 50 wriggling fry. Doug’s fishroom impressed us all and gave us a model to which we can aspire.

We will plan another field trip next year, but it will be hard to beat what we did this time around!

EXCHANGE REPORT

**“Breeding *Apistogramma caucatoides* ‘Super Reds’” by Jen Silverman
Tank Tales, Aquarium Club of Lancaster County, October 2024**

I have discovered that Jen’s articles are always filled with wit and humor, even an article like this where she has to admit a few failures before crowing about the successes. She decided to start her journey with cichlids with *A. caucatoides* because it’s small, beautiful and plentiful at aquarium society auction. She fed her trio of one male and two females with high quality dry food, frozen food and live brine shrimp and white worms. She chose a trio because “the male will choose his preferred female to spawn with, and then they will have fun protecting their eggs and fry from the 3rd wheel female.” *A. caucatoides* lays its eggs on the roof of a cave. The first batch of fry was eaten by the male. To thwart the male, she pulled the second batch of eggs on the half coconut shell, but the eggs fungused. To get around these problems, Jen sucked out the free-swimming fry as soon as she saw them and before the male could have a meal of them. That worked, but “Mom was NOT happy with me.” The mother took better care of the fry on the fourth try, but Jen still siphoned them out for their own protection.

**“*Neolamprologus multifasciatus* AKA Multis Shell Dwellers” by Larry Thompson
Tank Tales, Aquarium Club of Lancaster County, October 2024**

Larry set up his 20 gallon tank in typical Tanganyika fashion, with mid to upper seventies temperature and hard, alkaline water. Though small, the multis had no problem moving their shells around the tank, to their liking. High energy fish, “nothing special [was] required to breed them. They’re ease of breeding almost feels like Guppy level...” In case you’re wondering, “despite living in shells, multis won’t actually eat any of the snails in the tank.”

**“*Limia islai* AKA Tiger Limia” by Larry Thompson
Tank Tales, Aquarium Club of Lancaster County, October 2024**

Tiger limias are members of the family *Poeciliidae* along with guppies, but have a distinct series of vertical strips which led to the tiger limia common name. Larry’s tigers were quite shy which he addressed by creating an open feeding area which forced the fish to come in the open to eat. However, “noise and sight tend to create darting behavior in adults.” Larry’s fish really liked the sinking algae tabs. His article includes three nice photographs of the fish.

***Neoheterandria elegans*: A Micro-Predator Called ‘Teddy’” by Ed Moats
Finformation, Greater Pittsburgh Aquarium Society Inc., October 2024**

The Tiger Teddy livebearer has a reputation for being difficult to spawn, maybe because of their size: “I knew these fish were small, but I was shocked to see that they rival *Neoheterandria formosa*, the Least Killifish, in size.” Due to their reputation of ingesting anything that will fit in their tiny mouths, when it came time to spawn the fish, Ed filled the tank with guppy grass and removed the ripe female to a breeder box containing guppy grass. “To say the fry are small is an understatement.” They look like small dots and required Golden Pearls (5-50), fed four to five times daily, as their first food. Only after a week of growth were they able to handle newly hatched brine shrimp.

**“*Hoplisoma microcanthum*, AKA *Corydoras microcanthus*” by Regina Spotti
Finformation, Greater Pittsburgh Aquarium Society Inc., September 2024**

These small, former *Corydoras* catfish from Argentina prefer cooler water. Regina used floating and sunken acrylic yarn mops in the breeding tank and got the fish to spawn by feeding them live white worms. Getting the fish to spawn was not much of a problem, but getting viable eggs and fry that would live for more than a few days was difficult. Regina tried many different combinations of water chemistry, aeration and so on but “each time I removed eggs, nothing good came of it.” After finding fry in the breeding tank, now she just leaves the eggs there to “just let Nature take her course.”

**“EAS Fall Auction” by Wilma Chesnut
ARVAS Aquatic Digest, Allegheny River Valley Aquarium Society, November/December 2024**

Wilma reports that the recent Erie Aquarium Society auction lasted until 8:00 PM! Randy Seufert was the auctioneer and followed his usual practice of not taking a break during the auction. Wow, nine hours straight; how does he do it? I had the pleasure of meeting Wilma, the Secretary/Treasurer/Editor of ARVAS, for the first time at the fall Tropical Fish Club of Erie County auction in September. She loves to attend auctions for the pleasure of meeting other aquarists and making friends. “So when the next auction comes up, get up and go to it, and help support a fish club.”
