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

Fishroom Visit: Joe Sullivan

It's funny how one event can lead to a completely unexpected outcome. Case in point: the sale of my unused 45XH aquarium led me to visit one of the most unusual fishrooms I've ever seen.

About 45 years ago I bought a 45XH aquarium (that's a standard 30 gallon tank that is extended to 24 inches high instead of 16 inches) and built a stand to accommodate this unusual dimension. A few years later, after having to put the hobby on hold, I sold the tank but kept the stand. It moved with our household belongings around the country, serving as a shelf to put stuff on. When I retired and got back into the hobby in 2021, I bought a new 45XH and returned the stand to its original purpose. That aquarium was perfect for growing plants (requiring a powerful new LED light) and viewing angelfish and other fish. But eventually I decided to focus on spawning fish (yay, BAP!) and took this tank and its stand out of service to make room for breeder-type aquariums (low and wide instead of tall). I listed the tank, stand, top and light on Facebook Marketplace but had no takers despite several price drops. I gave up and moved the setup to our unheated back basement where it sat for several years.

In an effort to declutter the house, we decided to get serious about selling and getting rid of stuff, so I re-listed the tank setup on FBM with another lower price. Mixed in with over two dozen spambot responses was one that seemed genuine. The guy who showed up was not only enthusiastic about acquiring this setup but also was super-knowledgeable. I never pass up an opportunity to talk up the Central New York Aquarium Society, and the buyer already knew about the club from our friends at Low Tide Corals (thanks, Low Tide!). When I asked him which fish he kept, he really grabbed my attention stating that he spawns Apistos in Syracuse city tap water, which is hard and alkaline. Due to lack of space, I don't have room to keep and breed large fish. The small size of apistos would make them a natural fit for my setup, but I have shied away from them due to their proclivity for softer, more neutral water. I urged the buyer to join CNYAS.

Several months later, when I didn't hear from the buyer, I emailed him to tell him about our annual auction, and he said he would attend. Well, Joe Sullivan attended the auction, bought a bunch of fish and is a new member of CNYAS. Joe made a point of looking me up at the auction, and since I hadn't forgotten about his feat of spawning apistos in Syracuse tap water, I suggested he bring a bag of apistos to the next meeting. As the May meeting approached, I made sure I had enough money to buy these fish by utilizing the cashback option at the Bank of Wegmans earlier that day. I was disappointed when Joe did not show up at the meeting. Not willing to let the poor guy be, I emailed asking if I could come to his place to purchase the fish.

I apologize for the long and wordy introduction to this fishroom visit article, but I marvel at how the sale of a forlorn aquarium setup led me to one of the most interesting fishrooms I've ever seen.

I knew something was up when I got out of the car and noticed a sign in Joe's front yard that said "Pardon Our Weeds We are Gardening for Pollinators and Wildlife." This was confirmed when I saw that his entire enclosed front porch is taken up with growout trays of *Nepenthe* and *Sarracenia* pitcher plants. Entering the living room, I noticed that he was watching fish videos on his bigscreen TV and that told me, "Wow, this guy is hardcore!" I marveled at the *Epipremnum* plant, commonly known as "pothos," with roots in an aquarium and the plant growing from one end of his living room to the other. That's got to be 25 feet! I complimented him on the aquascaping in his living room tanks. He uses CaribSea Eco-Complete as a substrate in his planted tanks

Do you have a tub in your dining room with two large koi?

Joe does!

Descending to the basement, the first thing I noticed was three features that I also have in my fishroom that ease maintenance: a laundry tub, concrete floor and a floor drain. Also prominent is his RODI (reverse osmosis/deionization) system. Joe creates two barrels (about 50 gallons) a week of this water, which he uses not only for fish not accustomed to hard, alkaline water, but also certain delicate terrestrial plants (more on that later).

Getting down to business, Joe showed me the apistos and explained in detail how the rainy/dry seasons impact their spawning in the wild. Wait

a sec, this is a lot more than "I put a pair in the tank, fed them and they spawned." Turns out, Joe has a master's degree in Fish and Wildlife Biology and Management from SUNY ESF. And lots of practical experience too, racking up nine years working in a Rochester fish store.

Lots of aquarists spawn cichlids and livebearers, but how many have spawned tetras? Joe has a 75 gallon tank of diamond tetras, *Moenkhausia pittieri*, that spawn on a regular basis. I saw three generations of fry in the grow-out tanks. You'd think to spawn these fish, you'd need a lot of Java moss, guppy grass, or spawning mops, but no, there aren't many plants in this tank. In an upper corner of the tank is a mesh pot filled with mulm and roots of a terrestrial plant. The fish either spawn in this pot, or the tiny fry find their way into the pot, where then dine on micro-organisms. When Joe disturbs the pot, the fry fall out, and he catches them and puts them in a grow-out tank. What a unique and successful way of spawning diamond tetras.

Next to the diamond tetra tank is an impressive 150 gallon aquarium housing, among others, a rainbowfish tank boss and a huge seven year-old Royal Pleco catfish that grinds driftwood down to shavings. This is the first low-iron glass tank I've seen. Low-iron glass is exceptionally clear without the blue-green tint that regular sheet glass has. That glass combined with a sump filter makes it easy to see all the fish in the crystal clear water. This tank receives its semi-weekly water change using the waste water from the RODI system. The sump is drilled, and the tubing attached to the bulkhead sends the overflow from the water change to the floor drain.

If you run out of room for tanks in your basement, living room and dining room, the next logical place is your bedroom, and that's where I found my 45XH setup. Joe has the beautiful and very desirable checkerboard cichlid, *Dicrossus filamentosus*, in that tank. I was so pleased to see this display tank once again put to good use. In another tank he has festivums, *Mesonauta festivus*, a common South American cichlid but not seen in the hobby much anymore. It's a fairly peaceful fish with a distinctive black line running diagonally from dorsal fin through the eye. If he can spawn them in our hard, alkaline tap water, I will buy the fry!

Joe supported our annual auction by purchasing rainbow fry, bronze corydoras, two king tiger plecos, and even a bag of my trout goodeids, *Ilyodon furcidens*. I took him a bag of *Limia islai* and the cash I would have bid at the May meeting auction and got a trio of *Apistogramma cacatuoides*. I urged him to participate in the CNYAS Breeder's Award Program.

I mentioned Joe's credentials and experience with fish, but there are other things he does that indicate that he's a pro. For instance, he utilizes not one, but two quarantine tanks. Newly acquired fish from a trusted source go in one tank and are observed for four weeks before being placed in their home tanks. All other fish, for example from Petco, go in a separate quarantine tank for three months

Joe hatches brine shrimp for the fry, although he swears by ground-up pellet food from Keeping Fish Simple (Australia). And when he bagged the apistos he was giving me, he solved the problem I have, which is how to keep the bag open while putting the fish in it. It's a trick he learned working at the fish store: roll the top of the bag down several inches and let it float in the tank. The bubble formed in the part of the bag that was rolled down has enough buoyancy to float the bag, allowing the aquarist to use two hands to get the fish out of the net and into the bag. Finally, Joe urged me to use non-detergent Magic Eraser to remove algae from aquarium glass. It's very inexpensive (search for "melamine sponge" on Amazon) and works great. Joe gave me some samples.

While in the basement I noticed a corner of the room that was sheathed in plastic sheet, with a zippered plastic sheet door. When I asked Joe what this was, his response was that breeding tropical fish is only his number two hobby. His primary interest is plants, especially carnivorous plants. In the plastic-encased room, which is heated to tropical temperatures and kept humid with a mister, are dozens of *Nepenthe* tropical pitcher plants. They emit a sweet nectar, and when bugs enter the tube to investigate, they are digested. These very expensive plants are rather delicate, and I mentioned earlier that some of the RODI water is for these plants. When I asked Joe how he got involved with carnivorous plants (and he is involved, as a member of the International Carnivorous Plant Society), he surprised me by stating that he got the idea from a speaker at one of the informal *aquarium* meetings in Rochester. (Big city Rochester has no formal aquarium society; I'm so proud that we in Central New York do!) Joe, who works for a company dealing with Onondaga Lake remediation, has started a business with a partner that will focus on cultivating and selling plants that are native to Central New York in addition to the carnivorous plants.

Wow, what a visit! I had told The Chief that this visit would not take too long, back in 45 minutes. Returning home two-and-a-half hours later, I wouldn't blame her for wondering what the heck I was doing. Joe Sullivan's fishroom (and plants) are fascinating and unlike anything else I've seen. I hope this friendly, knowledgeable and enthusiastic aquarist will be a regular at our meetings and become active in the CNYAS.



FISH FRIENDS FROM AFAR #36 EXCHANGE REPORT

The Missouri Aquarium Society is taking readers on an around-the-world tour this year, and the May/June issue (99 pages!) brings us to the Caribbean.

"Poecilids of the Caribbean" by Mike Hellweg, CFN (Certified Fish Nut), *The Darter*, Missouri Aquarium Society, May/June 2025

"Looking at the map of the Caribbean islands today, you might wonder how the heck freshwater fishes got to those seemingly isolated islands." Various theories have been proposed to explain how this happened, all leading to the idea that at one time the islands were connected to the mainland. "While one might think the islands are tiny and lack any major freshwater features beyond resort swimming pools" (ha, ha), Mike reports that there is a lot of water on some of the islands while others sport creeks and drainage ditches that often run dry. Mike goes on to describe the major poecilids of the Caribbean, concentrating on the genera *Poecilia, Gambusia, Giardinus* and *Limia*.

"Sunken Treasure: Sex and Evolution in the *Limia*" by Sebastian L. Chavez *The Darter*, Missouri Aquarium Society, May/June 2025

Sebastian informs the reader of what the livebearer *Limia* can tell us about evolution. Found only in the Caribbean, the 23 species of Limia can inhabit water ranging from hyper-saline ponds to clear fresh water. Experiments have shown that *Limia perugiae* males select the largest females for mating. "Despite their small size, *Limia* fishes are incredibly sophisticated in their behaviors, from their mating preferences to their ability to navigate extreme environmental conditions."

"Brackish Habitats: Estuaries and Their Inhabitants" by David Farel *The Darter*, Missouri Aquarium Society, May/June 2025

David explains in detail the various types of habitats that are considered "brackish," such as intertidal flats, salt marshes, mangroves, estuaries and coastal lagoons. He provides a helpful chart describing how the aquarist can replicate each of these habitats. The aquarium should be covered to minimize evaporation. "While salinity changes are unlikely to bother fish, it may affect biological filtration in the tank, leading to an ammonia spike." He stresses the importance of researching the fish you wish to keep for the habitat you are setting up. David recommends a "cleanup crew," since most brackish tanks do not feature plants, and "Without plant to export nutrients, brackish tanks will be prone to algae." He provides a helpful chart listing the differences in maintenance needed for low-salinity tanks versus high-salinity tanks and concludes, "Every aquarist should try a brackish aquarium at least once."

"Eye Opener" by Bill Duzen Some Things Fishy, Tropical Fish Club of Erie County, May 2025

"While cleaning out my office, I have only been retired for 10 years, no need to rush these things..." With an opening line like that, I just had to finish reading Bill's article. He found three old copies of *The Aquarium* magazine from the 1930s, and his article is Bill's trip down memory lane, remembering the companies, most long-since gone, that sold products in the old days. Bill helpfully converts the dollars into today's value and discovers that we are paying less for our fish and equipment than the old timers did, adjusted for inflation.



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
