
President's Message September 2025


- 1. Treasurer-Report and budget.

My Meeting with Paul Loiselle

Paul Loiselle, a giant in the aquarium hobby, died in April. Soon after, Daryl Hutchins, editor of *Buntbarsche Bulletin*, the journal of the American Cichlid Association, sent an email to the membership explaining that an upcoming issue would be devoted to Dr. Loiselle and would consist of several articles by Paul along with members' experiences and reminiscences. Daryl asked for contributions, so I thought, OK, I had only one brief contact with Dr. Loiselle, but it was meaningful to me, so I wrote and submitted an article.

The September *Buntharsche Bulletin* #326 appeared in late August, and in addition to two reprints of Paul's articles from the 1970s, there were articles by people who knew Paul on a personal basis. While I only talked to Paul that one time in 1980, I'm not ashamed to share my story. I know Paul gave at least one presentation at a CNYAS meeting, so I'm sure there are members who have had much more contact with Paul than I had.

Below is the article as it appeared in the September Buntbarsche Bulletin #326:

In 1978, a year after graduating from college, I decided to restart my aquarium hobby, only this time to focus on cichlids instead of livebearers. After reading *Freshwater and Marine Aquarium* magazine and joining the American Cichlid Association, I discovered that Paul Loiselle wrote informative, clear, witty, even humorous articles. So when I attended my first ACA convention, held in 1980 in Cleveland, and noticed Paul was sitting alone at breakfast, I worked up my courage and asked if I could sit with him. Eager to hide my ignorance, I let him do the talking by asking him lots of questions. Now, 45 years later, I checked my diary entry for that day and am disappointed that I did not note what Paul talked about. On the other hand, at least I thought to have someone use my camera to take a picture of us. It's a treasured photo in my albums.

I'll never forget that Paul took time out to talk to a nobody like me. I'm 70 years old now and can't think of a more famous person who has ever talked to me.





FISH FRIENDS FROM AFAR #37 EXCHANGE REPORT

Somebody read my review! Yes, I'm fully aware that probably not many people read what I write. In fact, a CNYAS member told me quite frankly that he never reads my stuff, "but I do look at the pictures." So I was excited when the editor of the Greater City (New York City) Aquarium Society quoted in full my review of one of the articles that appeared in their *Modern Aquarium* magazine. The reason? "The moral of this story? There are probably more than one, but one that comes to mind that your (our) articles do have a wider reach that 'just' our members. We are part of a larger community of 'fish people.' So *do* share your knowledge and experience" I write these reviews to let our members know of useful, helpful information that aquarists around the country are talking about. If you find a review interesting and want to read the full article, just get in touch with me, and I'll be happy to pass it along.

"BAP Report: *Belonesox belazinus*" by Karen Haas *Tank Tales*, Aquarium Club of Lancaster County, June 2025

I can always count on Karen Haas for a well-written, informative article, and I was not disappointed when she started with these first two sentences: "The Pike Livebearer, *Belonesox belazinus*, is an eating machine. I purchased a pair to be birth control for convict fry...." Turns out, they weren't all that interested in convict fry, which hang out at the bottom of the tank while Pikes like midwater. The Pike Livebearer is an ambush predator that hides in plants and lunges at their prey. I did not realize that "They are not the type of predator that eats a big meal once a week. They need to be fed every day!" This a large livebearer, with females exceeding 8" and males 4½". Preparation is the key for spawning this fish, because the female can drop 100 fry, and "If you don't separate the fry or have enough live food on hand, they will cannibalize each other." (Nice fish, huh?) Karen recommends having a large supply of guppies ready to feed the Pike Livebearers. This is a fish that definitely prefers, even requires, live food. She also suggests a generous helping of live or plastic plants so the fry have somewhere to hide.

"The Red-Bellied Piranha: A Quiet Aquarium Inhabitant With a Notorious Past" by Steven Bieda Tropiquarium, Motor City Aquarium Society, June 2025

As I write this, June 18, 2025, we are only two days away from the 50th anniversary of the release of the famous movie, *Jaws*, marking the start of the summer blockbuster tradition. The piranha has also achieved cinematic fame, being the star of five Hollywood films. Contributing to its reputation as a fierce man-eating machine was Theodore Roosevelt's description of what he saw when he visited South America in 1913. Steven provides the quote from Roosevelt's book. More helpfully, he informs us what it takes to keep this fish in the home aquarium. First, this fish is a big one, topping out at 14". It should be kept in a school of about six in a large, single-species tank. "While the fish are unlikely to attack an aquarist working on an aquarium note that the behavior of this fish can be unpredictable in most circumstances." I recall the story Rosario LaCorte tells in his book, *An Aquarist's Journey*, of a partner whose ankle was bitten by a piranha while on an expedition in Brazil. The deep wound was difficult to treat and laid the man up in bed for two full weeks. Piranha can be bred in captivity; Steven recounts while he was working in a pet store, a customer regularly brought 25-50 piranha fry to the store for sale. The customer bred the fish in several large aquariums and transferred the fry to kiddie pools. "Strangely enough, he didn't plan on breeding the fish, according to him 'it just happened' in his aquarium and he figured out a means to capitalize on it."

"Ode to a Bucket" by Stephen Sica Modern Aquarium, Greater City Aquarium Society, June 2025

Some articles are informative and others are, well, fluff pieces. With a title like "Ode to a Bucket," I just had to read Stephen's article, the idea for which he admits came from his wife, who told him he "was able to make nothing out of something." I enjoyed this humorous article along with the photos of the numerous buckets that he uses for temporary homes for fish and plants and to store stuff. While we're on this momentous topic, let me just say that if you are transporting fish in a bucket, use square-sided buckets: they make it easier to corner and catch the fish. "What's a good fish tank without a good bucket?"

"Dr. Paul V. Loiselle 1945-2025: A Personal Memoir" by Joseph Ferdenzi *Modern Aquarium*, Greater City Aquarium Society, June 2025

The well-known scientist, hobbyist and aquarium society speaker Paul Loiselle passed away in April, and many tributes have been written about this great aquarist. "Paul was my friend, and whose passing is a great loss to me." Joseph's article provides some personal and moving examples of Paul's generosity and friendship. Paul "was a world-renowned scientist and a very active and prominent hobbyist—such a combination is exceedingly rare."

"A Mass-Culturable Crustacean: Culturing Opae Ula for Aquatic Micropredators" by David Farel *The Darter Mini-Mag*, Missouri Aquarium Society, June 2025

I culture a variety of live foods for my fish, but here's one I hadn't heard of. Opae Ula, scientific name *Halocaridina rubra*, is a small crustacean that lives in brackish water in Hawaii. "Growing to less than an inch in size and reproducing rapidly, Opae Ula are an excellent feeder for small micropredator species. David provides detailed instructions on cultivating them. A group of 25 can be purchased on Amazon for \$70, and "After a few months, you should have several hundred shrimp. Don't harvest so many that the populations drop." *The Darter Mini-Mag* is absolutely free and well worth reading as it's published. Go to www.dartermagazine.com and click on "Mini-Mag" to sign up.

"The Eel Loaches: *Pangio* spp." by Mike Hellweg, CFN (Certified Fish Nut) *The Darter*, Missouri Aquarium Society, July/August 2025

The July/August 2025 issue of *The Darter* focuses on fish and plants from Indonesia. When Mike Hellweg writes an article, you're guaranteed to get an exceptionally well-written and informative article. Mike focuses on the Pangio (eel-like) loaches, such as the well-known Kuhli loach. While I don't keep these loaches, Mike's article was so interesting that I'm tempted to start. Mike provides photos of the eel loaches that are imported most frequently. Those of us who have read about these loaches already know that they like driftwood, plants and plenty of places to hide. What I didn't know was that these loaches can be spawned in the home aquarium, and in fact Mike has done it many times, two different ways. The first way involves widening the slots of an old-fashioned undergravel filter and covering it with pea gravel. Under the right conditions, both adults and their fry can be found under the filter. "Apparently, there was plenty of food for the youngsters, plenty of circulation, and enough places to hide from the adults." The second approach is to use a well-aged matten filter in a planted aquarium; soon enough, fry will be found behind the matten filter. "A mature matten filter is covered with microscopic life, especially ciliates and rotifers, which along with good water circulation is exactly what the young loaches seem to need." The actual spawning occurs near the surface, and the fertilized eggs soon sink and will catch on the roots of floating water sprite. For the first few days the fry can eat the micro-organisms found in "sponge grunge," but "Be sure to squeeze the grunge into a container first, let the dirt settle to the bottom, then siphon off the water above it, which is where most of the food animals will be."

"Brachygobius: A Lot of Attitude in a Small Package" by Andrej Spec The Darter, Missouri Aquarium Society, July/August 2025

Bumblebee gobies are "tiny, brightly colored, highly contrasted little gobies with a face grumpier than a bouncer at closing time." Andrej notes that this genus can be divided into species that require at least some time in brackish water or they die, and species that can survive in fresh water. "Even freshwater species appreciate harder water with added salt." He provides identification, photos, and commentary on the species so the aquarist does not make the mistake of purchasing the harder-to-keep type that require brackish water. These small fish require live food, sometimes frozen food, never flakes or pellets. If you are lucky enough to spawn them, be warned that the fry "will be tiny: positively microscopic" and will need to be fed floating live food such as *Paramecium* and rotifers.

"Colorful Claws" by Monika Rademacher and Oliver Mengedoht *The Darter*, Missouri Aquarium Society, July/August 2025

This article caught my attention because about half of it focuses on vampire crabs, which I noticed were available for sale during my visit to Aquatic Haven in Fulton. The first half of the article is an in-depth discussion of crabs in general, including labeling all the parts of these ten-legged crustaceans, the crab life cycle and the molting process. Vampire crabs "came onto the market and quickly impressed vivarium enthusiasts with their striking coloring....They are also easy to breed." They don't require large tanks, and the authors provide a detailed description, with photographs, of setting up a tank for these crabs. Food requirements are "insects and their larvae...earthworms, snails...as well as fish, shrimp and flake food." Frozen food and pieces of fish are also accepted. "It is important not to offer too much food, as this can quickly lead to unnoticed pockets of decay with highly unpleasant consequences for the animals and their owners." The authors also provide a thorough explanation of how to breed vampire crabs.

"Tips From a Fish Room" by Jules Birnbaum Modern Aquarium, Greater City Aquarium Society, August 2025

This article is a collection of helpful tips that Jules has discovered.

- He feeds his newly free-swimming fry by first mixing the very fine golden pearls food in a small container of water, then using a turkey baster so he can get the food to where the fry hang out.
- He replaced his LEDs that have hard-to-program timers with LEDs featuring simpler timers; I also have some LEDs with timers that require me to read the owner's manual to program, but I'm too cheap to replace them yet!
- Like Jules, I have discovered that when airline tubing is in water for a long time and gets hard, it is difficult to re-attach it back on to a sponge filter. My solution is to cut off and throw away the hard part and attach the remaining soft airline tubing to the filter (when I cut the original length of tubing I allowed plenty of slack that permits this). Jules instead has replaced his sponge filters with ones manufactured by AngelsPlus: the lift tube has a hole in it, and all you have to do is put the airline tubing into the hole.
- Jules recommends a rather slow rate of air flow for your sponge filter, since too much air does not allow for enough water to be carried up the tube and expelled.
- Air valves clog after years of use; Jules opens the valves and sticks something thin deep into the valve to clear accumulated blockage.
- Finally, if you have a fish room or are thinking of starting one, "stay in touch with JEHMCO, the fish room supply house." Great advice. Not only does JEHMCO stock hard-to-find parts needed for a fish room, they also are highly experienced and will walk you through exactly what you need for your fish room.
